Where are we?



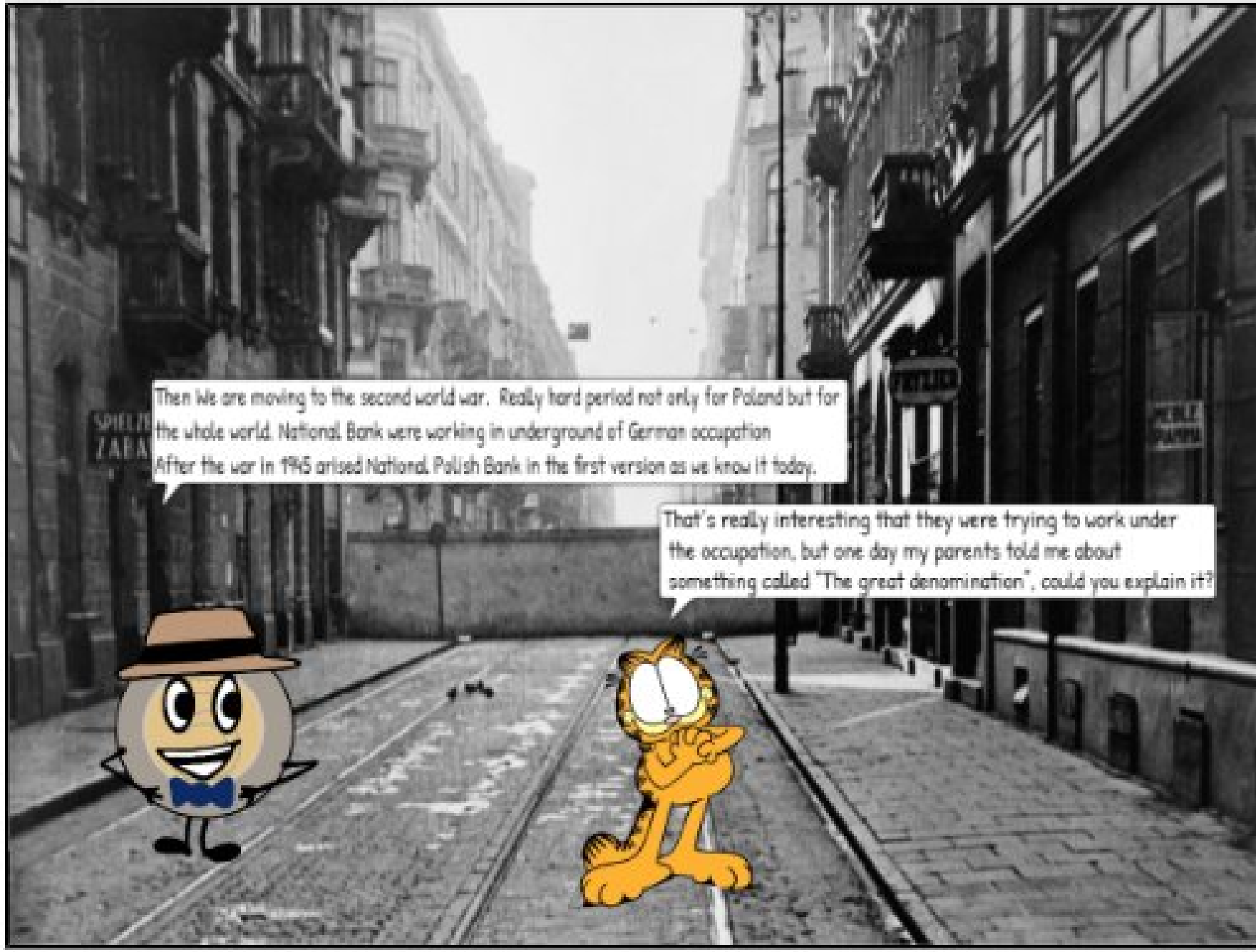
We are in the first National Polish Bank founded this year.

all of this, why me?



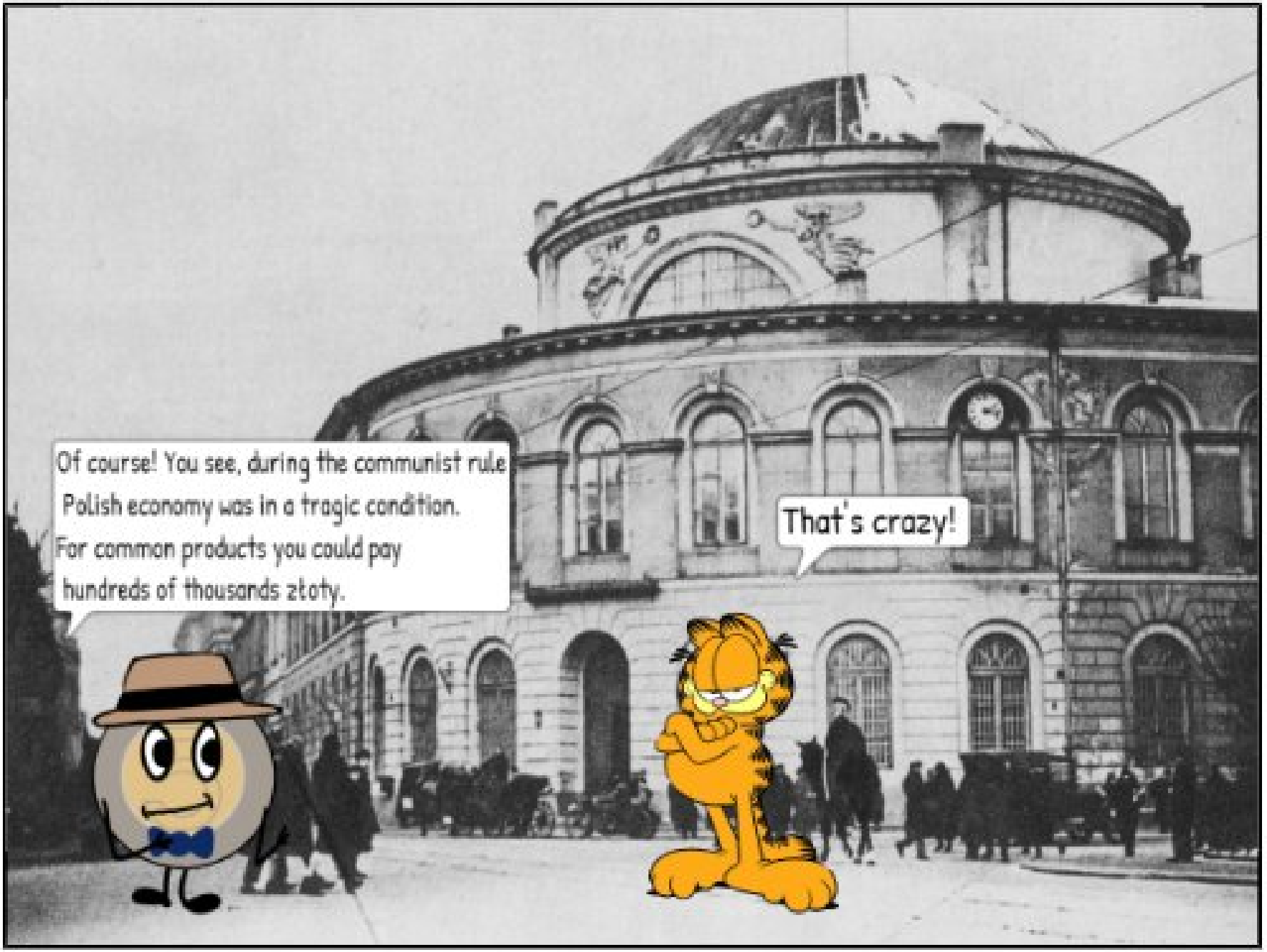
I see you don't like your job because you don't understand it

Hmm, fascinating, then what happens next?



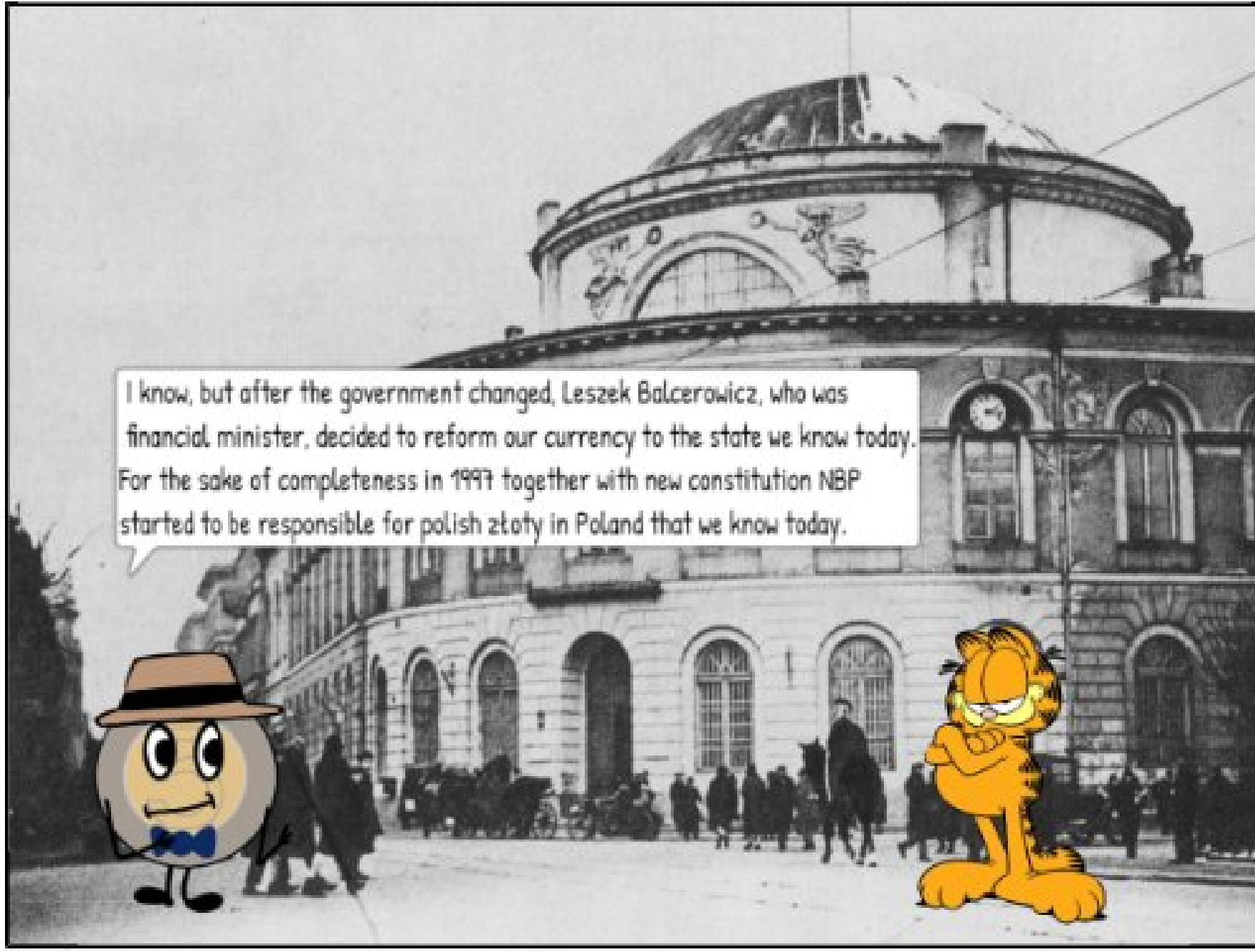
Then we are moving to the second world war. Really hard period not only for Poland but for

something called "The great denomination", could you explain it?

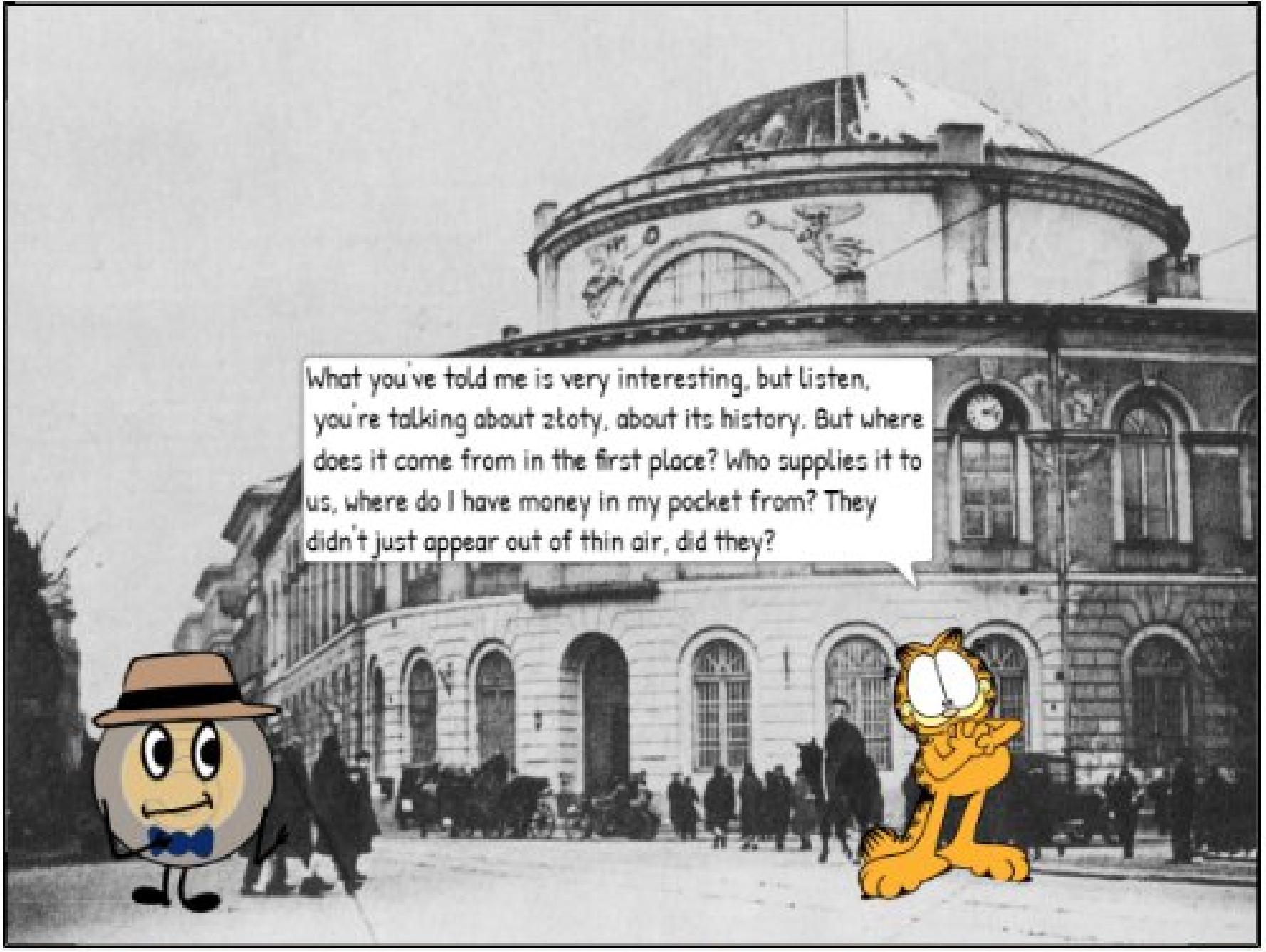


Of course! You see, during the communist rule

hundreds of thousands zloty.

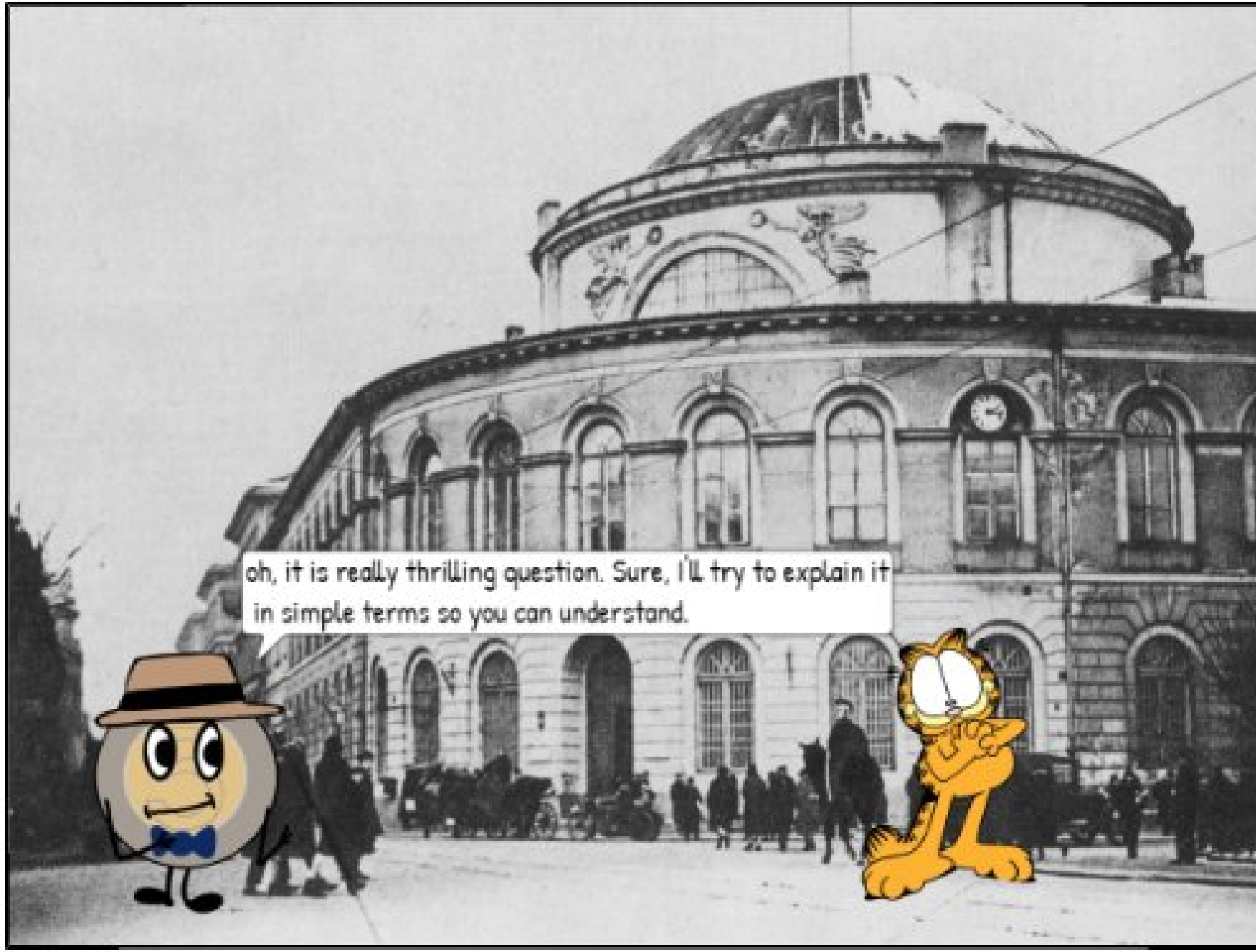
That's crazy!



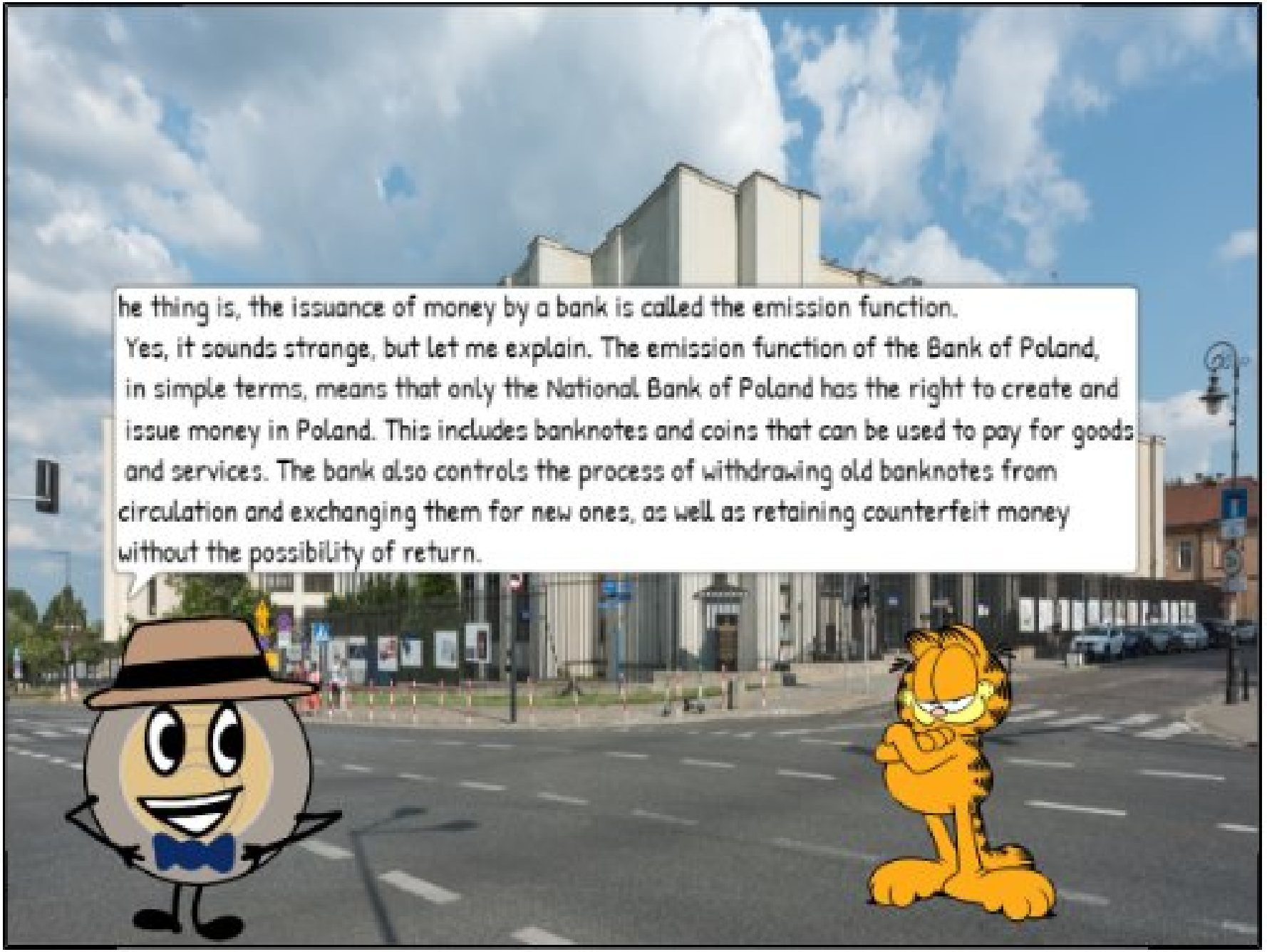
I know, but after the government changed, Leszek Balcerowicz, who was

didn't just appear out of thin air, did they?



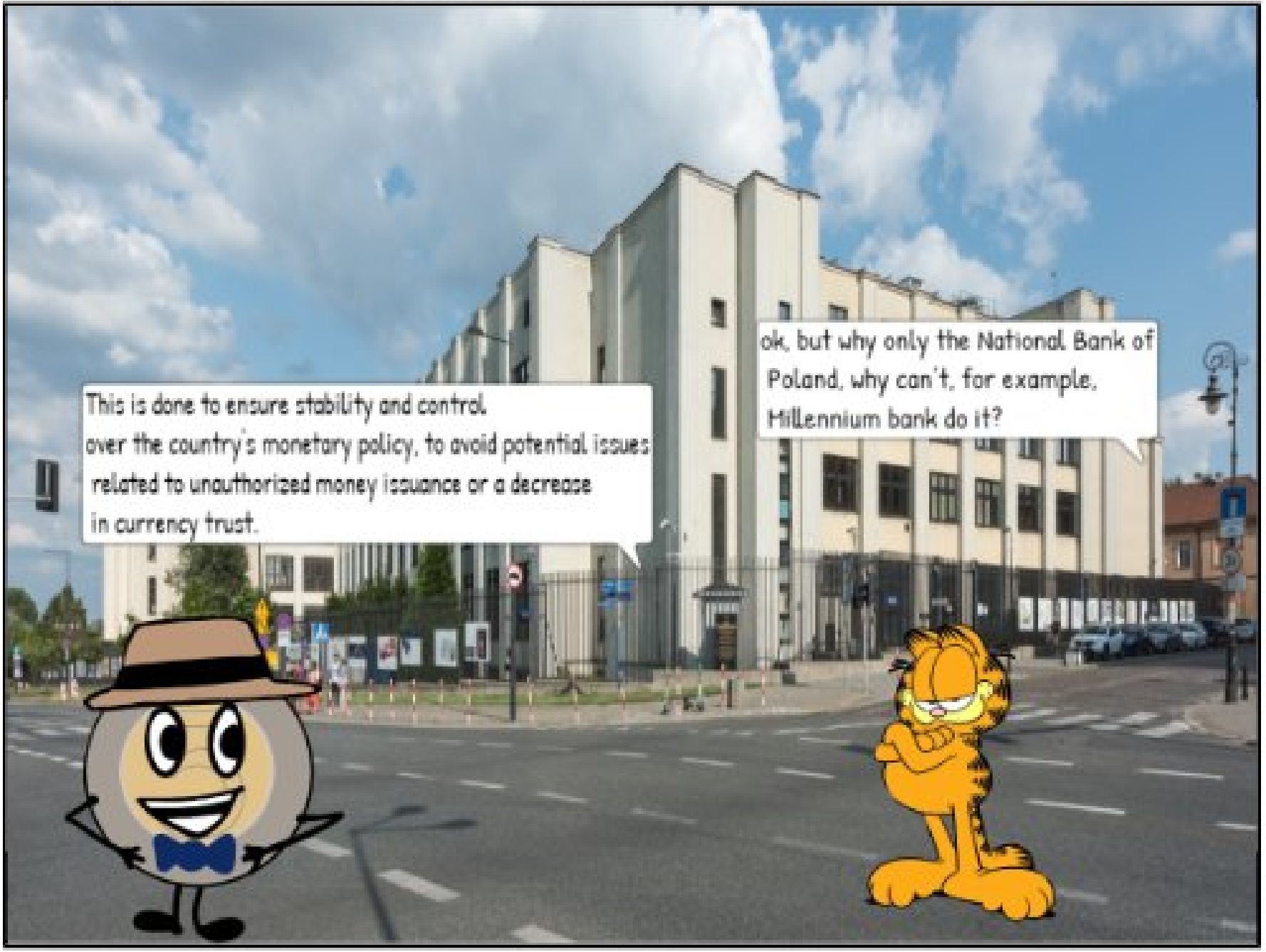
oh, it is really thrilling question. Sure, I'll try to explain it

he thing is, the issuance of money by a bank is called the emission function of the bank.
Yes, it sounds serious, but let me explain. The emission function of the Bank of Poland,
in simple terms, means that only the National Bank of Poland has the right to create and
issue money in Poland. This includes banknotes and coins that can be used to pay for goods
and services. The bank also controls the process of withdrawing old banknotes from
circulation and exchanging them for new ones, as well as retaining counterfeit money
without the possibility of return.

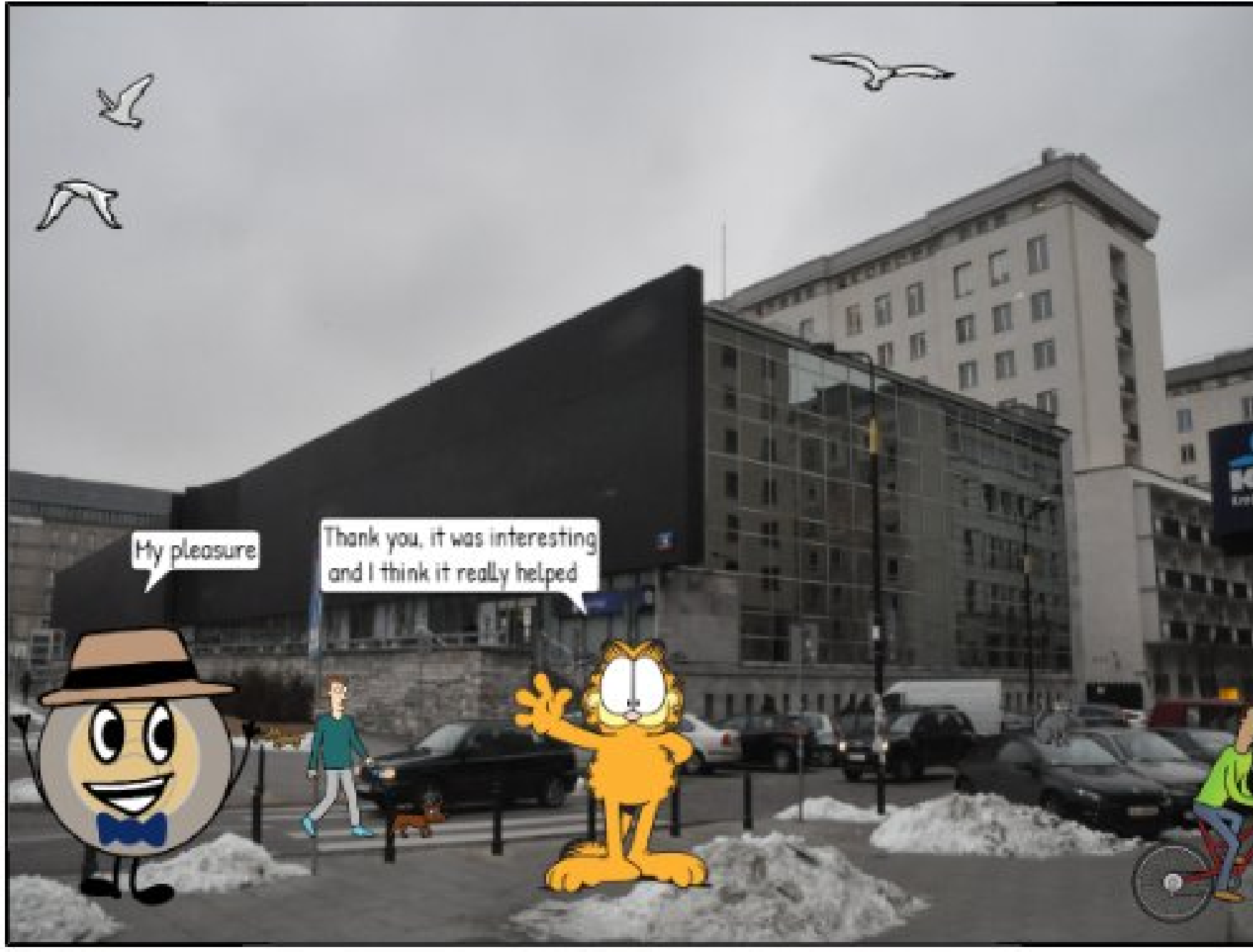
